Knowing When We've Arrived

Outputs

- IPTC Website developed and launched by end of Year 1
- 100% of schools adopted reverse transfer policies by Year 2
- Memorandum of Agreement for transfer admission guarantee, signed by end of Year 1
- Meetings among community college and 4Y institution faculty
- Presentations from member institutions at conferences regarding IPTC's work

Outcomes

- 100% of schools in consortium participate in the adoption of 6 common transfer majors
- 90% of schools in consortium accept the A.A. and/or A.S. by Year 3
- 5-20% increase (vary by institution) in retention rates of transfer students, with growth in Years 2 and 3
- Reach 10,000 unique website visits by Year 3
- Provide 2 training webinars per semester for one year,
 then 1 per semester each following year
