


#### **Our Vision**

# Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCU)

- Tribal colleges and universities provide a dynamic higher education opportunity, most on or near reservation lands. Known for their remarkable programs, culturally-relevant curricula, and familial student care – tribal colleges allow students to further their careers, attain an advanced degree, or better support their communities.
- 35 TCUs are accredited colleges that have received their TCU accreditation status from AIHEC.

- Transfer Advisory Committee, with seven seated members from TCUs who have College Transfer experience, currently developing a *Transfer* Student Experience Course focused on preparing our Indigenous Student population for Transfer Success.





Top 3 goals of surveyed TCUs over next four years




2. Increase number of students who graduate with Associates degree from our TCU before transferring to a four-year institution



#### Underrepresentation

Sense of "invisibility" due to the low representation of Indigenous students in Mainstream Universities



#### **Cultural Disconnection**

Indigenous students may experience a cultural disconnect when transferring from Tribal Colleges to Mainstream Universities

Experiencing social injustice, including racism and discrimination, is a challenge that can affect the well-being and academic success of Indigenous students at Mainstream Universities.

#### **Navigating Transfer**

Indigenous students who transfer directly to a Mainstream University may have a harder time navigating the higher education system compared to those who have the support of a Tribal College community.



#### **Diverse Faculty**

Diverse faculty members at Mainstream Universities can contribute to mentorship and connection for indigenous students.



#### **Support Services**

Indigenous students base connection and trust when reaching out for support. Having culturally competent trained staff can develop and support Indigenous transfer students.



#### Financial and Housing

Financial Gaps when Transferring is a challenge many Indigenous students face. Along with affordable housing for those students Transferring as Single parents.



 While Native people have made significant progress in recent decades, they remain the most educationally underrepresented racial or ethnic group in the United States. Only 15.4 percent of Native people 25 years and over have earned a bachelor's degree or higher, or less than half the national average. [2] [1] U.S. Census Bureau. (2022). 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
